## NOTATIONS FROM APPLICATIONS

**N** ight Security Flight Commander. Participated in Tet offensive battle. Initially responded to 051 Gate area and then linked with responding forces. Evacuated wounded to Hospital. Also involved in May 1968 ground attack and numerous rocket attacks during the year.

Melvin G. Grover, Jr. 377th Security Police Squadron August '67 - August '68

lived in a hotel in Saigon. Commuted via the Navy bus. At one point bought a Honda 125 to ride but rarely did.

NCOIC of the night shift during the attack in December 1966. Just secured the APO and had the guys guard the doors and the rest get in the Registered Mail safe. The M16's were chained to the rack and we had no key. We had an old 45 pistol we had to wear to transport registered mail. The next day we had access to the gun rack key!

Joel K. Martin OL 1508 Det. 1500USAF Pac Postal & Courier, PACAF February '66 - February '67.

At TSN - across fence from cemetery, Tet was at Phu Bai - (Hue) above DaNang, arrange for Embassy Courier jet daily to pick-up film/prints of BDA's and troop movements.

I was a top "scrounge" of things you needed!!! Also worked for a while at RMK BRJ on their "island of goodies." downtown area as security guard for extra \$\$\$. Next to Agent Orange storage! Yummy!

**B** arracks right beside helicopter landing area. Unloaded all cargo flying in and reloaded it onto C-130's for distribution thru country. Constant rocket attacks hit barracks beside mine taking two airmen. Sergeant in Air force. Left as E-5.

### Looking Back to the Year 1960

1960 brought to us a new decade, and one for the ages. The decade of the 60's defined me as no other decade did or will ever. It started out so innocently and filled with so many expectations yet, it was filled with all the ugly life had to offer. I was destined to learn things no person should ever know. And once learned some of those things could not be unlearned.

In the news of 1960, a young John F. Kennedy was elected President. It was a stark contrast between the young and energetic Kennedy and the always reserved Richard Nixon. Does anyone remember the televised debates between Kennedy and Nixon?

New things were being marketed for our use. Felt-tipped pens were introduced as well as drinks being packaged in aluminum cans. In medicine the "pill" was introduced as well as the pacemaker.

Ford Motor Company cancelled the Edsel car and introduced a compact, economy car called the Falcon. Chevrolet introduced the air-cooled rear engine car called the Corvair.

Robert McNamara was instrumental in the development of the Ford Falcon and later served briefly as President of Ford Motor Company. With the election of John Kennedy as President, McNamara was named Secretary of Defense and headed to Washington where he later directed the war efforts in Vietnam under Lyndon Johnson.

The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) was founded. It would be years before anyone noticed this organization.

President Eisenhower faced an international incident when the Russians shot down a U-2 spy plane. The pilot, Gary Powers, was captured and was later returned via a prisoner exchange.

That little known place called Vietnam now had approximately 900 "advisors" to train and advise the South Vietnamese forces. Five advisors died in 1960 bringing the war deaths to nine. Seemingly no one had a clue of what was to come. The United States announced plans of sending 3,500 troops to Vietnam.

For entertainment we had movies, TV's sports, and listened to the best music of all time, usually on AM radios.

At the movies in 1960, we watched such films as *The Alamo, The Apartment, Elmer Gantry, Sons and Lovers, The Sundowners, Inherit the Wind.* Among the favorite TV shows were Gunsmoke, Have Gun Will Travel, Real McCoy's, Andy Griffith Show, Rawhide, and Candid Camera. Since I was in the all-important teenage years, music was becoming special. Here are the top 10 songs of 1960 as listed by Billboard. How many of these classic sounds do you remember? Remember dancing to them? Do you recall holding a small transistor radio to your ear?

A Summer Place by Percy Faith; He'll Have to Go by Jim Reeves; Cathy's Clown by Everly Brothers; Running Bear by Johnny Preston; Teen Angel by Mark Denning; I'm Sorry by Brenda Lee; It's Now or Never by Elvis; Handy Man by Jimmy Jones; Stuck on You by Elvis; The Twist by Chubby Checker.

"The Twist" started a dance craze lasting for years where you could dance without touching your partner.

Major League sports were coming of age primarily because of the growth of television.

In Major League baseball, the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the New York Yankees in the World Series. The game is best known because of Bill Mazeroski's walk-off home run in the ninth inning to end the seventh game and the World Series.

In professional football, the Philadelphia Eagles defeated the Green Bay Packers to win the National Football League championship. A new pro football league was started in 1960 called the American Football League. In its first championship game, the Houston Oilers defeated the Los Angeles Chargers.

In college football, Minnesota and Mississippi were crowned National Co-Champions. Ohio State defeated California in College Basketball.
