A visit to Colorado Springs is just the beginning of a great Colorado adventure. There is so much to see and do that it would take several editions of *Revetments* to try and describe them all. So, to begin our adventure, let's start with the elephant in the room.

Pike's Peak

Pike's Peak is literally in the backyard of our hotel, the Colorado Springs Marriott. There are several ways of visiting this most famous mountain in Colorado. For those who wish to take it easy and view all that there is to see, there is the Cog Railway. Cost is \$40.00/person plus a \$5.00 vehicle parking fee at the foot of the mountain. For the more adventurous, one can drive to the top of the mountain. The roadway is now paved all the way to the top, so no more sliding around precipitous curves on gravel roads. Cost is \$15.00 for one or \$50.00 for a carload of 5 people. And for the even more energetic, there is also an option to ride your bike to the top. Let's just say that not many in our group will be exercising this option. The temperature differential between the base and the top of the mountain can be 30-35°F so be sure to bring along a sweater or jacket.

Garden of the Gods

Located less than twenty minutes from our hotel, this park, as well as its Visitor Center, are free and open to the public. This is a "must see" destination while in Colorado. The natural rock formations are breathtaking and you are likely to see rock-climbers scaling the heights as you walk through the park. Just a reminder that the walk through the park can be quite exhausting as there are some sections of the paths that can be quite steep. Be sure to bring plenty of bottled water and any walking aides, such as a cane, as you may feel necessary. The Visitors Center is located across the highway from the park and contains a Café as well, making this the perfect spot to end your park visit.

Cave of the Winds

Located just West of town, this attraction has been drawing thousands of tourists yearly. Guided tours are available daily, and cost approximately \$19.00 per person, depending on type of tour. Not only is the cave the attraction, as views from the visitor's center are spectacular as well.

Manitou Cliff Dwellings

These Anasazi cliff dwellings date back 800-1000 years. These are not just something you look at and take pictures of. You are able to walk thru the dwellings to experience what life was like back then. In addition, there are two museums, one dedicated to the Pueblo, and the other to the Caves. In addition, there is a gift shop and snack bar. Sen-

Royal Gorge

There are two ways to see these natural, as well as manmade wonders. Soaring over 1000' above the Arkansas River, the bridge can inspire both fear, and/or wonder, as you walk across. In addition, there are gondola rides available, and for the truly adventurous, a zip-line! Whichever you choose, this will remain firmly in your memory for years to come.

Another, more "civilized" way of viewing the bridge is by booking a reservation on the Royal Gorge train. With a cold beverage in hand, a three-course meal in front of you, and a 360° view of the Super Dome train carriage, you can enjoy a relaxing journey through the canyon, 1000' beneath the bridge. They will be offering a special Oktoberfest menu and selection of locally brewed beers at that time of year.

Cripple Creek

This little mining and gambling town has grown to become one of the more popular gaming and shopping centers in the State. Currently there are 8 casinos in operation. Its Main Street has been restored to its Old West glory days and provides a picturesque setting nestled in the mountains. Just be sure to keep a tight hold on your wallet or purse.

Other Attractions

There is just so much to see and do in Colorado that it is just impossible to try and condense that into a one or twopage article for *Revetments*. The few things that I mentioned above are all less than one hour from our hotel. And let's not forget Colorado Springs itself. It has an "Old Town" area with boutiques, art studios, and eateries. The city is also home to the United States Olympic Training Center. And the world-famous Broadmoor Hotel is close by. And from the city one can view Cheyenne Mountain, home of NORAD.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

The countdown has started for our 2017 Reunion.

Joe Kricho has been hard at work getting everything lined up. Some small glitches along the way but he has overcome!

Rita and I are looking forward to seeing everyone and visiting with friends and family and fellow TSNA members.

This is the requirement for those going to Peterson AFB Museum Tour on Saturday.

GENERAL:

The Peterson Air and Space Museum contains 2 exhibit buildings, airpark, and Medal of Honor Park. It's about 6 acres in size. We have sidewalks and benches throughout the complex. Everything is accessible except inside the Missile Procedures Trainer and the Warning Star aircraft both have steps for entry. Please ask anyone who uses a walker or wheelchair to bring that with them. The Museum doesn't have a snack bar or vending machines, so please ask everyone to make sure they've had breakfast or a snack before coming out. Photos and videos are welcome! We're pleased to have anything photographed. However, you can only take photos here at the Museum - you're not allowed to take photos of anything else on base without permission of the 21st Space Wing Public Affairs office. Pets are also welcome as long as they're on a leash.

ACCESS:

Everyone who comes on the base will need to show driver's license or military ID (active duty or retired). Passports are also acceptable.

For those on your tour who do not have military ID, I'll need a list of names by Wed, 13 September to send to our security forces to ensure your entry on Saturday.

Please supply their Full Name; Birth Date; Drivers' License Number.

Residents of Washington, Montana, Missouri, Maine, and Minnesota will need additional ID -- other than a driver's license.

On 15 August 2016 the Department of Homeland Security implemented portions of the Real ID Act (2005) that may significantly impact you or your visitors who are requiring unescorted entry onto Peterson AFB. Driver's Licenses (DL) from the following states/territories will <u>no longer be</u> considered valid as a sole-source form of identification (ID) for federal installations and facilities:

Minnesota, Missouri, Washington, Maine, Montana.

Individuals with an Enhanced Driver's License (EDL) from Minnesota and Washington will not be affected. However, standard DLs from those states are not valid. If you are unsure if you have an EDL, contact the issuing agency to verify.

Individuals with DLs from Colorado, Connecticut, the District of Columbia, Illinois, Maryland, Utah, and Vermont are valid; UNLESS they have a statement printed on the face of the ID stating "Not for Federal Identification" or "Federal Limits Apply".

Personnel in possession of a valid Federal Government issued credential, ie. Common Access Card, Retiree ID, Dependent ID, Federal PIV, and etcetera, will not be affected.

If a person is in possession of an invalid ID, and do not have a current Federal issued credential, they must be either escorted onto the installation by a person with a Federal issued credential or the member must present one of the following in conjunction with your DL to gain unescorted entry on to Peterson AFB:

United States Passport; Permanent Resident Card/ Alien Registration Card (Form I-551); Foreign Passport with (I-551) stamp; United States Coast Guard Merchant Mariner Legacy Card; Untied State Coast Guard New Merchant Mariner Credential; United States Social Security Card; Original Birth Certificate; Certification of Birth Abroad (issued by the Department of State); United States Citizen ID Card (Form I-197); Foreign Military or Host Nation Government ID Credentials.

On Saturday afternoon we will have a special guest speaker and author also. So be prepared to come listen and enjoy her presentation to our group.
