2019 TSNA REUNION SPEAKER



Dr. Blake Busbin is a three-time graduate of Auburn University, finishing his doctorate in social studies education in 2013. Following the completion of his Master's Degree in 2007, he joined the faculty at Auburn High School. During his tenure at Auburn High School, he launched a major public history project with his students documenting the stories of veterans and fallen heroes, the AHS Veterans Project. Through this effort, students have interviewed more than 300 veterans, primarily those of the Vietnam War, for the Library of Congress Veterans History Project and located several hundred pictures for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's "Wall of Faces" project. He served as a curriculum consultant for PBS on Ken Burns' *Vietnam* documentary and served as the expert speaker on an affiliated PBS student documentary on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. In recognition of his work, he received the 2015 Christa McAuliffe Reach for the Stars Award by the National Council for the Social Studies and was named the 2017 Alabama History Teacher of the Year by the Gilder Lehrman Institute for American History, which also named him

a top ten national finalist. In 2018, he was a "Top Four" finalist for Alabama Teacher of the Year. He is married to Anne Busbin, also a graduate of Auburn University College of Education, who is the school counselor at Richland Elementary in Auburn. They have three children: Parks, Campbell, and Miller.

Remembering Our Fallen

This Memorial Day past, the fallen heroes of Tan Son Nhut AFB, were remembered in a service at the Tan Son Nhut Memorial Bench located at the National Museum of the United States Air Force Memorial Gardens on Wright Patterson AFB, Dayton, Ohio. These brave men lost their lives defending Tan Son Nhut AFB from a massive attack during the 1968 Tet Offensive launched against US and South Vietnamese Forces. Their brave actions saved many lives on Tan Son Nhut Air Force Base, including some of our TSNA members, one of which participated in the service to honor our heroes.



Members from the VFW Post 8312 Honor Guard in Beavercreek, Ohio made up of John Hatagan (Honor Guard Cmdr.), Harley Groves (Gold Star Parent), TSNA Member Johnnie Jernigan, TSNA Chaplain Jimmy Smith, and VFW Post member Gary Smith paid honors to the Security Police personnel and other defenders of Tan Son Nhut AB who paid the ultimate sacrifice on that fateful day protecting their fellow veterans. We make an attempt to honor these brave men every Memorial Day and every Veteran's Day.

A memorial wreath was placed. Johnnie Jernigan led the service with opening comments remembering their sacrifice and bravery stating their actions were directly responsible for saving many lives on Tan Son Nhut, including his own, and that they would never be

Others attending were given the opportunity to comment. Chaplain Jim Smith commented on the purpose of Memorial Day which is set aside to remember the fallen and honor their service. THE LAST WELCOME HOME

Last month I received an appeal from my County VA Service Officer to attend the funeral of a Navy Petty Officer Third Class who had recently died. He was not homeless, however, no relatives could be found. More information was published in the local newspaper later that week. I knew I needed to attend.

On the day of the funeral I drove to the local funeral home with plans of joining with others who wanted to honor this fellow Vietnam Vet. "Others" proved to be many, many others.

More than 150 motorcycles, many with American flags flying and more than 50 cars, formed a procession that wound its way thru the streets of downtown Columbia, SC. The roar of those motorcycles vibrated all through me with a feeling of pride in our military. On every street the local police department cleared the intersections for us and traffic heading in our direction would stop. Some drivers exited their vehicles and rendered hand salutes.

Reaching I-77 north we entered the interstate. The Highway Patrol had stopped all traffic headed north bound until the entire funeral cortege had made it onto the highway. It was then that I realized the enormity of the turnout for James Miske. As far as I could see, forwards and backwards, we occupied the outside lane. Exiting onto a two lane road that took us to the Fort Jackson National Cemetery took several minutes. All traffic entering onto this road was blocked. At this point, my emotions were running high and I was very proud of my participation. My amazement was far from over...

Exiting our vehicles, we were joined by many local residents who were walking from their nearby homes and by active duty service members from all of the services. There were many soldiers who were stationed at Fort Jackson, airmen from Shaw AFB and McEntire Joint National Guard Base, and troops from Joint Base Charleston.

Final count of the mourners was more than 500 and this seemed to be entirely appropriate since we were at Fort Jackson and "Victory Begins Here". After the ceremony ended, many of us engaged in conversations on the way back to the parking area. Smiles were abundant.

None of us knew James Miske, but we knew he was a fellow veteran. It's a warm feeling knowing our brothers and sisters will not let us go alone. This will not be my last funeral for a vet I don't know. I thought about the experience for days and it touched my heart. Doing the right thing is not always easy to do, but it is always the right thing to do...

NOTATIONS FROM APPLICATIONS

My father, Carroll Milton Staten, was reassigned to the 616th M.A.S.S. (MAC) on 2 November, 1966. He departed Travis AFB on 31 January, 1967, and arrived TSN on February 5, 1967.

He arrived as a 1st Lt. and on April 2, 1967, was promoted to Captain in Regular AF, effective March 22, 1967.

His AFSC was 4344 - Aircraft Maintenance Officer.

Dad also spent time at Bien Hoa Air Base with Detachment 2 of the 616th MASS.

After Vietnam, Dad was assigned to Wiesbaden AFB in Germany, Chanute AFB in Illinois, Charleston AFB in South Carolina, Scott AFB in Illinois, and Wright-Patterson AFB in Ohio.

He retired from the Air Force Institute of Technology, Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, in August 1979.

Dad died on September 1, 2017, as a fully disabled vet (per the VA) from Parkinson's Disease due to his Agent Orange exposure in Vietnam.

My daughter, Hannah Staten, is working with our local city of Milton on the Patriots' Parkinson's Project - an awareness program for Vietnam vets exposed to Agent Orange! She is a high schooler!

FROM A "RED HORSE" MEMBER

I arrived June 1968 in South Vietnam 1st CEG, there were two ½ ton flatbed non-government vehicles, a ¾ ton truck and a couple of jeeps. I think there was a deuce ½ too, but a SSGT was trying to figure out how to take it home. Regardless, it wasn't around long. One of the flatbed trucks bed shifted during travel, but would slam back against the cab upon hard braking. The ¾ ton was painted a strange blue with a badly stenciled USAF on the doors. Our barracks was located parallel to the trainsit pad where RAAF C7 Caribou parked. The ¾ ton was parked along a fence separating it from C7 Wallaby Airlines aircraft.

One morning we came out to find a critter painted over the USAF. We put a heavy chain through the steering wheel that evening and called it done. The next morning our vehicle was gone. So goes the war need.

My duties required that I get a Vietnamese driver license. The process of getting the license was relatively simple. I wrote Jerry D on the form, but I got distracted by a very attractive young lady wearing a slit dress coming in the door behind me and to my left. The Vietnamese women at the counter scowled at me for not paying attention to her, but she completed my paperwork and gave me the license. When I looked at it for the first time, I chastised her for getting my name wrong. She had obviously made a mistake because Jerry D Jerry was incorrect! However, I had in fact written JERRY D JERRY on the form. It took some doing, but I was issued a corrected license as Jerry D Jenkins.
